Their dedication and sportsmanship continue to inspire their peers, following in the footsteps of five other players who had this opportunity last year and have since achieved remarkable results.













Tournaments & Events ~ Tildesley Shield '25~

NWST is once again the venue for the upcoming Tildesley Shield to be held on March 19th running through to March 21st.

The shield was first held in 1918, with Daphne Akhurst the winner of the singles competition and Normanhurst School, Ashfield, the overall winner.

Daphne, one of the best women tennis players Australia has produced, was a pupil of Normanhurst, a school which in 1918 had as its Headmistress Miss Evelyn Mary Tildesley.

It was Miss Evelyn Tildesley who donated "a beautiful oak and bronze shield" to encourage a tennis competition that emphasized team spirit, school spirit, and wide participation in tennis over individual competition. These values continue today.

Through 2025, NWST will go one step further with our SJC junior program by offering orange and green ball competitions.

These competitions create an earlier pathway for our younger students into yellow ball competitions and tournaments.

As the player develops and enhances their technical and tactical competencies, they will progress from stage to stage.

Orange balls are the same size as yellow balls, however have lower compression and are 50% slower.

Green balls are also the same size as yellow tennis ball, however they have a lower compression and are 25% slower than yellow tennis balls.

This lower compression slows the ball down and reduces bounce height, which enhances rallying, the cornerstone of the game of tennis.

Saturday Junior Grading ~ TERM 1 2025~













Grading is an important part of NWST's approach to match play.

A number of grading days were held in January for those new students and new members to the club. Welcome!

Our grading process is facilitated by a number of experienced graders who measure performance across a number of parameters including:

- Forehand and Backhand
- Serve
- Rally ability
- Movement and agility
- Anticipation
- Attitude
- Power and Accuracy

Grading also involves both singles and doubles play to measure the different skill sets required for both formats.

We also utilize existing SJC players as a benchmark to effectively grade our new players. This improves their chances of playing at a level or division that suits their abilities.

At NWST, we are also keen to engage new players' coaches to ensure we have a long-term view of their development. Combining lessons and competition is the perfect recipe for effective tennis development and improvement of UTR.

The playing format is DS5a-2, which includes 5 matches per player—2 singles and 1 doubles.

Connecting with Environment ~ Tennis Ball Management~

Here at North West Sydney Tennis, we pride ourselves on supporting the environment and holistic tennis ball management.

NWST has partnered with Treadlightly, a national initiative that recycles sporting balls, with tennis balls being a significant contributor.

A Treadlightly POS Bin is set up at the front of the pro shop at Pennant Hills, providing a refuge for used tennis balls.

Once the POS bin is full, we make the phone call, and the tennis balls are collected.

Feel free to drop your used tennis balls into our Treadlightly bin to help complete the tennis ball lifecycle.

Connecting with Environment ~ Return and Earn~

At NWST we lead the way in providing a pristine tennis precint and supporting the environment.

NWST has recently introduced the "Return and Earn" initiative, which assists in keeping our grounds clean and raising money to support our Junior Leaders program which assists in the development of skills prior to playing tennis.

The bins are easily identified by their distinct purple colour and easily understood labelling.

There are 8 bins located across our Pennant Hills tennis centre.

- 1 purple bin on top level
- 2 purple bins on mid level
- 4 purple bins on bottom level
- 1 in reserve

Contents Allowed :

- most drinks consumed "on the go" between 150ml and 3L
- includes soft drink, water, beer, juice etc

New Shed for Roller

NWST prides itself on providing seamless tournaments. Part of this is the availability of equipment prior to and during the tournament program, ensuring that tournament downtime is minimized.

A shed has been constructed on the 3rd level between courts 13 and 16, to hold a sponge roller. The roller is used to collect excess water on the court during a wet weather event.





Turfing

Turfing will commence in February for the new sandstone seating area between the clubhouse and our 2 matchplay courts.

This will place the final touches on what will be a great viewing and seating area.

Special Treatment of Newly Surfaced Courts

We pride ourselves on maintaining both existing and new court surfaces.

For our newly resurfaced courts 3 and 8, manual broom sanding is undertaken 3 times per week, as well as automated sanding which also occurs 3 times per week.

The courts are monitored closely until a point is reached where they are moved back into standard court maintenance program

Barbara also collects the milk and soft drink bottle lids, used for the "Lids 4 Kids" program, melted down and converted into varying prothesis.

- New Point of Sale (POS) system in the Proshop and a precursor to an upgrade of our Club Management system including our booking system
- Return and Earn purple bins will continue to create a "fighting fund" for our Junior Future Leaders program so please contribute as many recyclable containers and thank you to the Adult comp players who continue to provide a steady stream of bottles and cans every week ^(C)
- Treadlightly Initiative for the recycling of tennis
 balls
- Surveying our members will be a key part of listening and improving our offering so please provide that feedback when the surveys are sent out.
- Lease renewal remains a key priority and we're confident of our good outcome in 2025
- Inaugural orange and yellow ball competitions
- A survey is being created to select new outdoor chairs for members and guests.

NWST will be having a tilt at the Most Outstanding Tennis Club or Venue – Metro at the Tennis NSW Awards later in the year.

We have adjusted our Proshop pricing for food and drinks to keep pace with inflation. The team reviewed pricing at other Tennis Associations and recommended retail prices and we did need to bring our pricing into line. All revenue from the Proshop is re-invested into the Association so rest assured that the outcome of the price adjustment will contribute to the success of our Club.
